First, I am truly sorry about the fish kill that has occurred. With the lack of rain last summer and fall, the water level fell well below our recommended target levels, and you may recall my concern when I presented to you in November. I can offer some encouraging words, though: The fishery will recover, and, especially since it is a stocked fishery, the young fish will be expected to have a high rate of survival and to grow very quickly after a major die-off such as what has happened in Shoal Lake.

I know that everyone in the community is eager to get the water level management plan in place. Here is an update on that: When I presented on November 30, we had determined WHAT the water levels should be. Since then we've been working out HOW to achieve them. The RM Council has approved a design to upgrade the road crossing downstream of the lake, and our other recommendations and water level management plan are complete. The engineering design, three technical reports, and a report that summarizes our recommendations, are all posted on the RMYH website for viewing and downloading. Thank you for your patience with this major project.

With that work done, we are ready to submit the applications for Licenses for the road upgrade and operation of the control structure. Knowing the importance to many of getting these License applications submitted and approved, and knowing the massive collaborative effort it has taken to get us this far, I will be in town on May 14 with forms for people to indicate their support for the project. Given the history surrounding water levels in Shoal Lake, a unanimous show of support for the project will go a long way toward swift approval of the License applications. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact me directly as soon as possible.

So, for the sake of water levels that serve everyone's interests, there are two things left for everybody in Shoal Lake to do: Pray for rain, and come out to show your support for the water level management plan!

I look forward to seeing you all on the 14th.



This month I just wanted to touch on some out-door fire safety tips. As the weather warms up and we enter spring the risks of fire increase. In spring, the major risks mainly come from brush fires (either in the wind or related to folks burning yard debris after spring cleaning). In summer, barbeques, bonfires and campfires become a more significant part of the action. Here are some house hold fire tips to keep you and your family safe.

- items can ignite easily and spread in an instant.
- Be careful and cautious with any kind of flame or ignition source: matches, cigarettes, ashes, etc.
- Don't have any kind of outdoor fire/bonfire on a windy day or in dry conditions.
- Clear the ground of flammable material for at least 10 feet around your bonfire or barbeque.
- Never locate an open fire within 50 feet of any structure and give yourself at least 10 or more feet for a barbeque Have fire tools and a water supply available before you light anything.
- Always extinguish your fire with water at the end of the night or when you are done to minimize the risk of Keep pets and children away from the fire.

These are some basic tips to help with your household fire safety. Always consult with the Fire Department if you have any questions or concerns regarding fire safety, burn permits or fire bans. ~Emily Wolfe
