PROGRAM PURPOSE & OBJECTIVES

RM of Yellowhead residents may apply for funding assistance for community events and projects effecting one or more areas in the RM of Yellowhead. Projects must help enhance the lives of residents in the RM of Yellowhead and have a community impact. They may include capital infrastructure improvement projects, community events, activities or programs.

AVAILABLE FUNDING

We will fund a maximum of 50 per cent of eligible projects costs incurred to complete the project up to a maximum amount per community as outlined below based on per capita funding. In addition, the municipal funds of \$7500.00 may be requested and will be distributed based on need for any one or each community. WHEN TO APPLY?

New community initiatives, such as new programs or projects.

A couple of weeks ago I called into a radio station to enter a contest. Often they just ask for your name, phone number and location. R.M. of Yellowhead Tree Trimming Policy

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidelines for the Municipality and property owners/occupants with respect to the care of trees that are located along public streets and other rights of way within the R.M. of Yellowhead.

Procedure:

2)

1) Municipal Property

The Municipality is responsible for the ongoing maintenance of all trees/shrubs that are located on Municipal property including trimming of any projections over public sidewalks or any public street beyond the property line. All branches that interfere with sight lines at stop signs or roads will be removed by the Municipal Staff. Private Property

The owner or occupant of property with private trees or shrubs is responsible for all trimming of branches that overhang onto private property or Municipal property.

Where there are obstructions caused by the growth of trees/shrubs that are located on private property which abuts Municipal property including any impediment to street lighting, vehicular/pedestrian traffic, signage, and intersection sight lines, the property owner will be responsible for trimming. This maintenance will also apply to those private trees/shrubs whose roots may damage side walks, public streets and any infrastructure related to the provision of public utilities. The property owner may be notified by the Municipal Administrative Office to rectify these impediments and the property owner will have 14 days to be in full compliance. In those instances where the Municipality has to undertake to complete this work, the costs for this work will be the responsibility of the property owner. These costs may be collected by the Municipality in the same manner as a tax may be collected. The Municipality will have the authority to trim and/or remove any impediment to vehicular/pedestrian traffic, signage and intersection sight lines immediately. Trees/shrubs will only be removed due to one of the following:

celed and many cottage owners and boaters did not even put their boats in the lake this summer. Many people know of the controversy surrounding the lake and its level. One of the most common questions I am asked is "What is happening about the lake?". A consultant firm headed by Jay Toews was hired and the results of his study were released to the public this spring. Basically he recommends that the water level of the lake should be at a maximum of 547.4 meters and a minimum 547.2 meters. For information the maximum is # 4 on the level board at the dam and the minimum is #2 on the board. This would have minimal impact on landowners and still would help improve the water quality.

To do this there are basically two applications and licenses that would have to be followed. The study suggested that road #93 was holding back water from flowing down stream, so three six foot by 75 foot pipes would be installed on road #93 or the hydro line road. It has been designed for a 1 in 100 year flood. An engineered plan must be completed and approved before this continues. This is the first step and it is hoped that it can be done this fall as there is very little water to deal with which may eliminate the need for a coffer dam. After this is done we can proceed with the next step, to get approval for the license to install stop logs in the outlet to the minimum level of #2 or 547.2 meters. It is important to get this done as soon as possible so that water from this winters snow melt can be captured.


